A commitment examiner who is not so 6 satisfied must note that the examination was not satisfactorily accomplished, and the respondent 7 must be taken for a face-to-face examination in the physical presence of a person authorized to 8 perform examinations under G.S. 122C-283."

14 TECHNICAL CORRECTION TO STATUTE GOVERNING TRANSITIONAL15 PERMITS FOR FOOD ESTABLISHMENTS

SECTION 2.1. G.S. 130A-248(c) reads as rewritten:

17 "(c) If ownership of an establishment is transferred or the establishment is leased, the new 18 owner or lessee shall apply for a new permit. The new owner or lessee may also apply for a 19 transitional permit. A transitional permit may be issued upon the transfer of ownership or lease 20 of an establishment to allow the correction of construction and equipment problems that do not 21 represent an immediate threat to the public health. Upon issuance of a new permit or a transitional 22 permit for the same establishment, any previously issued permit for an establishment in that 23 location becomes void. This subsection does not prohibit issuing more than one owner or lessee 24 a permit for the same location if (i) more than one establishment is operated in the same physical 25 location and (ii) each establishment satisfies all of the rules and requirements of subsection (g) 26 (a) of this section. For purposes of this subsection, "transitional permit" shall mean-means a 27 permit issued upon the transfer of ownership or lease of an existing food establishment to allow 28 the correction of construction and equipment problems that do not represent an immediate threat 29 to the public health."

REGULATION OF TEMPORARY DISPLAY SPAS

SECTION 2.2. G.S. 130A-280 reads as rewritten:

33 "§ 130A-280. Scope.

34 This Article provides for the regulation of public swimming pools in the State as they may 35 affect the public health and safety. As used in this Article, the term "public swimming pool" means any structure, chamber, or tank containing an artificial body of water used by the public 36 37 for swimming, diving, wading, recreation, or therapy, together with buildings, appurtenances, 38 and equipment used in connection with the body of water, regardless of whether a fee is charged 39 for its use. The term includes municipal, school, hotel, motel, apartment, boarding house, athletic 40 club, or other membership facility pools and spas, spas operating for display at temporary events, 41 and artificial swimming lagoons. As used in this Article, an "artificial swimming lagoon" means any body of water used for recreational purposes with more than 20,000 square feet of surface 42 43 area, an artificial liner, and a method of disinfectant that results in a disinfectant residual in the 44 swimming zone that is protective of the public health. This Article does not apply to a private 45 pool serving a single family dwelling and used only by the residents of the dwelling and their guests. This Article also does not apply to therapeutic pools used in physical therapy programs 46 47 operated by medical facilities licensed by the Department or operated by a licensed physical 48 therapist, nor to therapeutic chambers drained, cleaned, and refilled after each individual use." 49
