3	REQUIREMENTS FOR THE REPLACEMENT OR RECONSTRUCTION OF		
4	STRUCTURES DAMAGED BY HISTORIC FLOOD EVENTS.		
5	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:		
6	<b>SECTION 1.(a)</b> G.S. 143-138 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:		
7	"(e1) Exemption for Historic Flood Event. – Notwithstanding any provision of law to the		
8	contrary, including subsection (e) of this section, the North Carolina State Building Code, any		
9	floodplain regulation established under Part 6 of Article 21 of Chapter 143 of the General		
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	11 <u>General Statutes, or any other local ordinance, the following shall apply:</u>		
12	(1) <u>Replacement or reconstruction. – The owner of a lawfully established building</u>		
13	or structure damaged by a historic flood event may replace or reconstruct the		
14	building or structure within the base floodplain, as defined in		
15	G.S. 143-215.52(1b), to the same or lesser extent or volume existing		
16	immediately before the historic flood event, without regard to changes in State		
17	or local regulations adopted after the building or structure was lawfully		
18	established, subject to the limitation of subdivision (2) of this subsection.		
19	(2) <u>Limitation. – Replacement or reconstruction that increases the extent or</u>		
20	volume of the building or structure within the base floodplain shall not be		
21	authorized unless hydrologic and hydraulic analyses, prepared in accordance		
22	with standard engineering practice by a registered design professional,		
23	demonstrate that the proposed replacement or reconstruction will not result in		
24 25	any increase in the base flood elevation.		
25 26	(3) Definitions. – For purposes of this subsection, the following definitions apply:		
26 27	a. <u>200-year flood. – A flood having a one-half of one percent (0.5%)</u>		
27	probability of being equaled or exceeded in any given year, resulting in floodwater elevations higher than the base flood elevation		
28 29	associated with a 100-year flood.		
29 30	b. Historic flood event. – A flood event that meets or exceeds a 200-year		
31	<u>b.</u> <u>Instone nood event. – A nood event that meets of exceeds a 200-year</u> flood."		
32	<b>SECTION 1.(b)</b> G.S. 143-215.54(a) reads as rewritten:		
33	"(a) A-Subject to G.S. 143-138(e1) and G.S. 160D-108, a local government may adopt		
34	ordinances to regulate uses in flood hazard areas and grant permits for the use of flood hazard		
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36	<b>SECTION 2</b> . This act is effective when it becomes law.		
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
