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Page 1 of 9 Amends Title [NO] ,2025 Fifth Edition Representative Prather moves to amend the bill on page 222, lines 7-8, by inserting between the lines the following: "REVISE ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS FOR OPPORTUNITY SCHOLARSHIPS AND INCREASE ACCOUNTABILITY AND REPORTING STANDARDS FOR NONPUBLIC SCHOOLS RECEIVING OPPORTUNITY SCHOLARSHIPS **SECTION 8A.15.(a)** G.S. 115C-562.1 reads as rewritten: "§ 115C-562.1. Definitions. The following definitions apply in this Part: Eligible student. A student residing in North Carolina who has not yet (3a) received a high school diploma and who meets all of the following requirements: Is eligible to attend a North Carolina public school pursuant to Article 25 of this Chapter. A child who is the age of 4 on or before April 16 is eligible to attend the following school year if the principal, or equivalent, of the school in which the child seeks to enroll finds that the student meets the requirements established by the Authority pursuant to G.S. 115C-562.2(d) and those findings are submitted to the Authority. Has not been enrolled in a postsecondary institution as a full-time b. student taking at least 12 hours of academic credit. Has not been placed in a nonpublic school or facility by a public c. agency at public expense. (3d)Eligible student. – A student residing in North Carolina who has not yet received a high school diploma and who meets all of the following requirements: Meets one of the following criteria: a. Was a student (i) assigned to and attending a public school full time pursuant to G.S. 115C-366 or (ii) enrolled full time in a Department of Defense Elementary and Secondary School,

(1) For students residing in households with an income level not in excess of the amount required for the student to qualify for the federal free or reduced-price lunch program, per year per eligible student, an amount of up to one hundred percent (100%) of the average State per pupil allocation for average daily membership in the prior fiscal year.

For students residing in households with an income level between the amount required for the student to qualify for the federal free or reduced-price lunch program and not in excess of two hundred percent (200%) of that amount, per year per eligible student, an amount of up to ninety percent (90%) of the average State per pupil allocation for average daily membership in the prior fiscal year.

 (3) For students residing in households with an income level of between two hundred percent (200%) of the amount required for the student to qualify for the federal free or reduced-price lunch program and not in excess of four hundred fifty percent (450%) of that amount, per year per eligible student, an amount of up to sixty percent (60%) of the average State per pupil allocation for average daily membership in the prior fiscal year.

(4) For all students, per year per eligible student, an amount of up to forty-five percent (45%) of the average State per pupil allocation for average daily membership in the prior fiscal year, unless the student qualifies for a higher amount under this subsection.

(b3) Tuition and fees for a nonpublic school may include tuition and fees for books, transportation, equipment, or other items required by the nonpublic school.

16		Education documentation for required tuition and fees charged to the student
17		by the nonpublic school. The Division shall collect this information and
18		publish it on its website.
19	<u>(1a)</u>	Limit increases to the costs of tuition and fees by no more than five percent
20		(5%) each school year.
21	(2)	Provide to the Authority a criminal background check conducted for the staff
22		member with the highest decision-making authority, as defined by the bylaws,
23		articles of incorporation, or other governing document. For all other
24		employees, if the nonpublic school is located in a local school administrative
25		unit that has adopted a policy requiring criminal history checks under
26		G.S. 115C-332, then the nonpublic school shall adopt a policy mirroring the
27		local board of education policy. Each nonpublic school shall apply its policy
28		uniformly in requiring applicants for employment to be checked for a criminal
29		history before the applicant is given an unconditional job offer. A nonpublic
30		school may employ an applicant conditionally while the board is checking the

16	nonpublic school to appeal for reconsideration of eligibility after one year. To ensure compliance		
17	the Board of Directors of the Authority shall review the criminal history provided under		
18	subdivision (2) of subsection (a) of this section to ensure that the person has not been convicted		
19	of any crime listed in G.S. 115C-332. The Board shall determine through this review whether th		
20	nonpublic school is noncompliant with this section. The Board shall make written findings with		
21	regard to how the criminal history information was used when making the compliance		
22	determination. The Board of Directors may delegate any of the duties in this subsection to the		
23	Executive Director of the Authority. As part of its review, the Board shall determine whether the		
24	results indicate that the staff member has any of the following disqualifying characteristics:		
25	(1) Poses a threat to the physical safety of students or personnel.		
26	(2) Demonstrates that he or she does not have the integrity or honesty to fulfill hi		
27	or her duties in overseeing State funds and the requirements of the scholarship		
28	grant program.		
29	(3) Has not fully satisfied the criminal sentencing obligations imposed following		
30	his or her conviction by a court of competent jurisdiction.
