SUMMARY: House Bill 560 would make it a felony to assault hospital personnel and licensed healthcare providers who are discharging or attempting to discharge their official duties. <u>The</u> <u>Proposed Committee Substitute (PCS) expands the list of victims to include all hospital personnel and</u> <u>licensed healthcare providers who are providing or attempting to provide services in a hospital (was ''the following emergency department personnel: physicians, physicians assistants, nurses, and licensed nurse practitioners'').</u>

CURRENT LAW: Under G.S. 14-34.6, a person is guilty of a Class I felony if the person commits an assault or affray causing physical injury on any of the following persons who are discharging or attempting to discharge their official duties:

- An emergency medical technician or other emergency health care provider.
- A medical responder.
- The following emergency department personnel: physicians, physicians assistants, nurses, and licensed practical nurses.
- A firefighter.

The felony classification increases for sentencing purposes to a Class H if the person commits an assault that inflicts serious bodily injury or uses a deadly weapon other than a firearm, and to a Class F if the person uses a firearm.

BILL ANALYSIS: The PCS for House Bill 560 would make it a felony to assault hospital personnel and licensed healthcare providers who are providing or attempting to provide services in a hospital.

EFFECTIVE DATE: This act becomes effective December 1, 2015, and applies to offenses committed on or after that date.
