

## **HOUSE BILL 584:** Use of Position/Letters of Reference

SUMMARY: S.L. 2015-08 amends the State Government Ethics Act to permit a covered person to mention their public position in certain letters of reference and in responses to inquiries of potential employers.

This act became effective on October 11, 2015.

**CURRENT LAW:** In the absence of a statutory exception, the State Government Ethics Act provides in G.S. 138A-31(b) that a "covered person" shall not mention or authorize another person to mention the covered person's public position in nongovernmental advertising that advances the private interest of the covered person or others. There are currently six exceptions to this prohibition:


- 1. Political advertising.
- 2. News stories and articles.
- 3. The inclusion of a covered person's public position in a directory or a biographical listing.
- 4. The inclusion of a covered person's public position in an agenda or other document related to a meeting, conference, or similar event when the disclosure could reasonably be considered material by an individual attending the meeting, conference, or similar event.
- 5. The inclusion of a covered person's public position in a charitable solicitation for a nonprofit business entity qualifying under 26 U.S.C. § 501(c)(3).
- 6. The disclosure of a covered person's position to an existing or prospective customer, supplier, or client when the disclosure could reasonably be considered material by the customer, supplier, or client.

**BILL ANALYSIS:** The act amends G.S. 138A-31(b) to permit covered persons to mention or authorize others to mention the covered person's public position in a letter of character reference for individuals:

- seeking admission to a school or institute of higher education
- seeking an academic scholarship
- seeking leniency in sentencing or other matters related to probation or parole; and
- seeking employment, at the request of that individual or in response to an inquiry of a potential employer

**EFFECTIVE DATE:** This act became effective on August 11, 2015.
