

HOUSE BILL 698: Baby Carlie Nugent Bill

SUMMARY: House Bill 698 requires the Commission for Public Health to adopt rules to implement a screening test for severe combined immunodeficiency (SCID) and other T-Cell lymphopenias detectable as a result of SCID.

**CURRENT LAW: G.S. 130A-125** pertains to the screening of newborns for metabolic and other hereditary and congenital disorders. **G.S. 130A-25(a)** requires the Department to establish and administer a Newborn Screening Program to include the development and distribution of educational materials regarding the availability and benefits of newborn screening; laboratory testing; the development of follow-up protocols to assure early treatment for identified children, and the provision of genetic counseling and support services; the provision of necessary dietary treatment products or medications for identified children; the provision of physiological screening in each ear for the presence of permanent hearing loss; and the provision of pulse oximetry screening to detect congenital heart defects.

**BILL ANALYSIS:** House Bill 698 requires the Commission for Public Health to amend the rules for the Newborn Screening Program to add to the newborn screening panel a screening test for severe combined immunodeficiency (SCID) and other T-Cell lympopenias detectable as a result of SCID.

**EFFECTIVE DATE:** This bill becomes effective when it becomes law.

**BACKGROUND:** HB 698, v.2, contained a fee increase and an appropriation. These two sections of the bill have been removed since the fee increase is contained in Section 12E.12 of S.L. 2015-241 (HB 97) and the appropriation is reflected on page G11, Item 54, of the Joint Conference Committee Report on the Base, Expansion and Capital Budgets.
