SUMMARY: Senate Bill 654 (proposed committee substitute) requires the Department of Transportation to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the Wilmington Urban Area Metropolitan Planning Organization and its members for any claims arising out of its adoption, filing, or amendment of a corridor map; and makes conforming changes.

The PCS removes a provision concerning the Wilmington Urban Area Metropolitan Planning Organization's authority to delete a corridor map.

CURRENT LAW: The Transportation Corridor Official Map Act was enacted in 1987, and it authorizes the Department of Transportation and other governing bodies to adopt and file transportation corridor maps, which place restrictions on property located within a corridor.

In 2006, the Wilmington Urban Area Metropolitan Planning Organization was added to the list of entities authorized to adopt and amend transportation corridor maps under the Map Act, for two specified projects, U-4751¹ and R-3300. The Wilmington MPO filed a map under the Map Act for one project, R-3300, the US 17 bypass of Hampstead.

BILL ANALYSIS: Senate Bill 654 (PCS):

- directs NC DOT to "defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the Wilmington Urban Area Metropolitan Planning Organization and its members against any claims, civil actions, and proceedings related to or arising out of the Wilmington Urban Area Metropolitan Planning Organization's adoption, filing, or amendment of a transportation corridor official map".
- makes conforming changes throughout provisions in the Map Act that were not made when the Wilmington Urban Area Metropolitan Planning Organization was authorized to adopt and amend the two specified corridor maps under the Act in 2006.

EFFECTIVE DATE: The change to (g) of G.S. 136-44.50 is effective when the act becomes law, and applies to maps filed, adopted, or amended before that date. The remainder of the act is effective when it becomes law and would apply to filings, adoptions, or amendments before, on, or after that date.
