OVERVIEW: *House Bill 379 would establish the Joint Legislative Task Force on Regulatory Reform.*

BILL ANALYSIS: House Bill 379 would establish the Joint Legislative Task Force on Regulatory Reform (Task Forces) as follows:

Purpose and Duties:

The purpose of the Task Force would be to solicit and review proposals on ways to improve the regulatory climate of North Carolina. The Task Force would consider:

- Methods to eliminate ineffective or overly burdensome regulation.
- Options to streamline implementation and reduce the cost of complying with certain State regulations.
- Mechanisms to quickly identify and review disproportionately misinterpreted or challenged regulations.
- Other ideas for improving the regulatory climate of the State.

Membership:

The Task Force would consist of 12 members appointed as follows:

- Six members appointed by the Speaker of the House as follows: a member of the House; two at-large public members; and three members with active participation and expertise in business services, environmental services, or education and workforce development.
- Six members appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate as follows: a member of the Senate; two at-large public members; and three members with active participation and expertise in information technology, health care, or construction.

Reporting and Termination:

The Task Force would submit a final report to the General Assembly on or before December 31, 2018, and would terminate upon the earlier of December 31, 2018, or submission of its report.

EFFECTIVE DATE: This act is effective when it becomes law.

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
