**OVERVIEW:** *Senate Bill 265 would revise and consolidate the Charter of the City of Creedmoor and would become effective when it becomes law.*

[As introduced, this bill was identical to H342, as introduced by Rep. Yarborough, which is currently in House Finance.]

**BILL ANALYSIS:** Senate Bill 265 would repeal the 1969 Charter of the City of Creedmoor except where otherwise noted and would make additional general Charter revisions. Specifically, the bill would:

- Eliminate the metes and bounds description of the corporate boundaries and define the corporate limits as those existing at the time the bill is ratified as shown on the official map as from time to altered.
- Specify action to be taken regarding the official map of the City upon alteration of corporate boundaries.
- Update the provisions pertaining to the organization and administration of government and formally establish the council-manager form of government in the Charter.
- Preserve the authority of the City to collect a motor vehicle tax.
- Preserve the authority of the City to collect delinquent stormwater fees in the same manner as delinquent property taxes.
- Make other conforming changes regarding the impact of the bill on prior acts, laws, or ordinances.
- Contain a severability clause providing that the invalidity of one provision of this act shall not affect the remaining provisions otherwise valid.

**EFFECTIVE DATE:** The bill becomes effective when it becomes law.

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
