OVERVIEW: The PCS to House Bill 1097 clarifies when subsequent court orders will supersede similar provisions in domestic violence protective orders.

CURRENT LAW: G.S. 50B-7 states the remedies in Chapter 50B are not exclusive and clarifies when a subsequent order will supersede similar provisions in a previous domestic violence protective order.

BILL ANALYSIS: This PCS clarifies that only subsequent orders under Chapter 50 or Chapter 110 can supersede similar provisions in a prior domestic violence protective order.

EFFECTIVE DATE: This act becomes effective August 1, 2020, and applies to orders in effect on or after that date.

BACKGROUND: G.S. 50B-7(b) was previously amended in <u>Session Law 2019-168</u>. The changes made in this PCS are clarifying changes to the language in that session law.
