OVERVIEW: House Bill 507 would make it unlawful for any person to cause a person under the age of 16 to be present at an exhibition featuring animal fighting.

CURRENT LAW:

A person who participates as a *spectator* or *profits* from an illegal animal fight is guilty as follows:

- **G.S. 14-362** (Cockfighting) Class I felony (3 to 24 months incarceration).
- **G.S. 14-362.1** (Animal fights, other than cock fight and dog fight) Class 2 misdemeanor (up to 60 days incarceration).
- G.S. 14-362.2 (Dog fighting) Class H felony (4 to 39 months incarceration).

Contributing to the Delinquency of a Minor :

Any person who is at least 16 that encourages or aids any juvenile to be in a place or condition, or to commit an act whereby the juvenile could be declared delinquent is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor (up to 120 days incarceration). G.S. 14-316.1.

BILL ANALYSIS: House Bill 507 would make it unlawful for any persons to cause a person under 16 years of age *to be present* at an exhibition featuring an illegal animal fight.

EFFECTIVE DATE: This act becomes effective December 1, 2019, and applies to offenses committed on or after that date.
