OVERVIEW: House Bill 554 would make technical and clarifying changes to the exam requirements for the practice of funeral service and require certificates of compliance with preneed funeral contracts to be filed with the Board of Funeral Service. Crematory licensees would be required to comply with federal regulations, to follow rules for disposal of pacemakers and other hazardous devices, and to obtain necessary documentation before cremating an individual who died in another state. Finally, it would require medical examiners to sign a death certificate within 5 days of receiving paperwork from a funeral home.

BILL ANALYSIS:

Section 1 would make technical changes to the exam requirements for the practice of funeral service and clarify that a passing score on an exam is good for five years. It would also require licensees who accept transfers of preneed funeral contracts to file a certificate of compliance with the Board of Funeral Service, require crematory licensees to comply with the federal Funeral Industry Practices in C.F.R. § 453, and require all licensees to comply with all regulations regarding the removal of pacemakers or other hazardous devices.

Section 2 would prevent crematory licensee from cremating individuals who died outside North Carolina without obtaining a burial transit form.

Section 3 would require medical examiners to sign death certificates within 5 days of receiving paperwork from a funeral home.

EFFECTIVE DATE: This act would be effective October 1, 2019, and apply to cremations on or after that date and licenses granted or renewed on or after that date.

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
