OVERVIEW: House Bill 577 would create Article 7 of Chapter 19A of the General Statutes for purposes of regulating the possession, import, purchase, or sale of Big Cats, Bears, Hyenas, and Great Apes.

CURRENT LAW: Chapter 19A of the General Statutes regulates the humane treatment and protection of certain domesticated animals, such as dogs and cats, as well as protection of black bears.

BILL ANALYSIS:

House Bill 577 would create "<u>Article 7. Big Cats, Bears, Hyenas, and Great Apes</u>" within Chapter 19A of the General Statutes for purposes of regulating the possession, import, purchase, or sale of *Big Cats, Bears, Hyenas,* and *Great Apes* (hereinafter "covered animals").

House Bill 577 would do the following:

- Establish defined terms related to the regulation and enforcement of covered animals.
- Make it unlawful to *import, possess, keep, purchase, have custody or control of, breed, or sell* a covered animal.
- Exempt certain institution and entities from engaging in acts prohibited by this Article.
- Exempt persons who lawfully possessed a covered animal prior to June 1, 2019 from acts prohibited by this Article, provided certain conditions are met.
- Require a covered animal be kept in a species-appropriate cage or travel container during transport, and make it unlawful to release a covered animal into the wild.
- Authorize State and local law enforcement officers, or any *animal control officer*, to enforce the provisions of this Article.
- Clarify that a city or county may adopt or enforce ordinances that further regulate covered animals.
- Establish procedures related to the seizure and forfeiture of covered animals.
- Authorize law enforcement to humanely euthanize a covered animal that is found at-large.
- Make each violation of this section punishable as a Class 2 misdemeanor, and payment of a civil penalty not to exceed \$5,000.
- Make it a Class A1 misdemeanor if a covered animal is found running at-large or causes property damage.

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- Make it a Class I felony if an act or omission under this Article causes serious bodily injury to a member of the public.
- Allow a person who resides in a county where a covered animal is kept to bring a civil action to enjoin any violation of this Article.

EFFECTIVE DATE: This act becomes effective December 1, 2019, and applies to offenses committed on or after that date.
