OVERVIEW: Senate Bill 4 is a local bill that would extend the terms of office for two members of the Board of Trustees of Coastal Carolina Community College. The terms would expire on June 30, 2020, instead of June 30, 2019. The act would be effective when it becomes law.

CURRENT LAW: G.S. 115D-12 establishes the local boards of trustees for community colleges. There are thirteen members on each board, including the president of the student body as an ex officio member. The remaining twelve members are appointed in groups of four respectively by the following entities:

- The board(s) of education of the local school administrative unit(s) located in the administrative area of the institution.
- The board(s) of commissioners of the county or counties in the administrative area of the institution.
- The Governor.

The terms of one or more trustees may be extended for one year to stagger the terms unless the terms are already staggered. Other than the president of the student body who serves ex officio, appointees serve four-year terms which begin on July 1. G.S. 115D-13.

BILL ANALYSIS: Senate Bill 4 would extend the terms of office of the following members of the Board of Trustees of Coastal Carolina Community College:

- Mr. Donald C. Williamson, appointed by the Onslow County Board of Education, or any member appointed to fill a vacancy in that seat for the remainder of the unexpired term.
- Ms. Debbi Rouse, appointed by the Onslow County Board of Commissioners, or any member appointed to fill a vacancy in that seat for the remainder of the unexpired term.

The terms of office would expire on June 30, 2020, instead of June 30, 2019. Successors to these seats would be appointed every four years thereafter.

EFFECTIVE DATE: The act would be effective when it becomes law.
