

SENATE BILL 578: Reduce Franchise Tax/Expand Film Grants.

OVERVIEW: Senate Bill 578 would do the following:1

• Reduce the franchise tax rate from \$1.50 to \$0.96 over a two-year span and remove one method of calculating a corporation's franchise tax base, beginning with the 2021 taxable year.

• Reduce the qualifying expense thresholds for awards from the Film and Entertainment Grant Fund (Fund) and increase from \$12 million to \$15 million the maximum grant amount for a single season of a television series.

This bill was vetoed by the Governor on November 8, 2019, has not been overridden by the General Assembly, and, therefore, has not become law.

BILL ANALYSIS AND EFFECTIVE DATES:

Section 1 would make the following franchise tax changes:

- Reduce the franchise tax rate from \$1.50 to \$0.96 per \$1,000 of tax base over a two-year span to \$1.29 for taxable year 2021 and to \$0.96 for taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 2022 for all corporations except electric power companies.
- Electric power companies would continue to pay a franchise tax rate of \$1.50 per \$1,000 of tax base until 2026. Effective for taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 2027, electric power companies would pay the franchise tax rate applicable to all corporations.
- Eliminate the 55% of appraised value method used to determine a corporation's franchise tax base, effective for taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 2021.

Section 2 would reduce the qualifying expense threshold for awards from the Film and Entertainment Grant Fund and would increase the maximum grant award amount for a single season of a television series from \$12 million to \$15 million. The qualifying expense thresholds would be reduced as follows:

- For feature-length films for theatrical viewing From \$3 million to \$1.5 million dollars.
- For a television movie From \$1 million to \$500,000 dollars.
- For a television series From \$1 million to \$500,000 per episode.
