OVERVIEW: Senate Bill 843 would waive the road test requirement to obtain a Level 2 limited provisional license. It would also appropriate funds to the Division of Motor Vehicles to expand operating hours at certain Division offices to accommodate increased demands following pandemic-related closures.

CURRENT LAW AND BACKGROUND: Under the graduated drivers license statute (G.S. 20-11), there are three levels of driving privileges for persons less than 18 years of age: Level 1 -limited learner's permit; Level 2 -limited provisional license; and Level 3 -full provisional license. (See the chart on page 2 for detailed requirements and restrictions for each level.)

The Division of Motor Vehicles has general statutory authority in issuing drivers licenses to administer tests, including road tests, in order to examine an applicant's physical and mental ability. However, it is a specific statutory requirement under the graduated drivers licensing provisions that an applicant pass a road test administered by the Division in order to obtain a Level 2 limited provisional license.

On March 18, 2020, the Division closed many offices and limited services, including suspension of road tests, due to the COVID-19 crisis. About 65 offices remain closed, and road tests are not currently being offered, except for commercial drivers licensing and medical reassessments.

BILL ANALYSIS: Senate Bill 843 would require the Division to waive the requirement that an applicant for a Level 2 limited provisional license pass a road test to obtain the license if the applicant meets all other requirements. Any Level 2 limited provisional license holder who receives a waiver under the act would be required to pass a road test prior to obtaining a Level 3 full provisional license.

The bill would also appropriate \$200,000 from the Highway Fund to the Division for a pilot program to expand operating hours at high-volume Division offices to accommodate increased demands resulting from COVID-related closures and delays.

EFFECTIVE DATE: The road test waiver provision would be effective when the bill becomes law and would expire on the date the Division resumes administering road tests. The appropriation would be effective July 1, 2020. The remainder of the act would be effective when it becomes law.

*All drivers must be in possession of license or permit when driving, and every person occupying the vehicle must have a safety belt properly fastened or be restrained by child passenger restraint system when the vehicle is in motion.

*A "supervising driver" is a parent, grandparent, guardian, or responsible person approved by the parent, guardian or DMV, who has been a licensed driver for at least five years.
