



HOUSE BILL 282: Mount Airy/Even-Year Elections.

OVERVIEW: House Bill 282 changes the regular municipal election cycle from odd-numbered years to even-numbered years for the City of Mount Airy, beginning with the 2022 election by extending the terms of the current mayor and commissioners for one year to implement the new election schedule.

CURRENT LAW: Generally, municipal elections are held in odd-numbered years. The City of Mount Airy conducts municipal elections in odd-numbered years, held on the Tuesday after the first Monday in November. Elections are conducted using the nonpartisan primary and election method. G.S. 163-279(a)(3) and G.S. 163-294.

The following chart summarizes the current City officers and their terms:

BILL ANALYSIS: House Bill 282 would amend the charter for the City of Mount Airy to require that regular municipal elections be held in even-numbered years, beginning in 2022. To implement this change, municipal elections would not be conducted in the City of Mount Airy in 2021, and the terms of office for the Mayor and all Commissioners would be extended by one year.

The Mayor would be elected in 2022 and every four years thereafter. Three Commissioners would be elected in 2024 and every four years thereafter. Two Commissioners would be elected in 2022 every four years thereafter.

EFFECTIVE DATE: Effective when it becomes law and applies to elections held on or after that date.

BACKGROUND: Regular municipal elections in most municipalities are held in odd-numbered years. The following municipalities hold regular municipal elections in even-numbered years:
