OVERVIEW: House Bill 648 would create an exemption in the practice of veterinary medicine for emergency medical services personnel who render emergency aid to an injured K-9 police unit animal at the scene of an emergency and would grant limited immunity in these circumstances.

The Proposed Committee Substitute (PCS) would incorporate emergency medical services rendered to a search and rescue dog in the veterinary practice exemption and limited immunity; and clarify emergency medical dispatchers would not be considered emergency medical services personnel.

## **BILL ANALYSIS:**

**Section 1.(a)** would create an exemption in the practice of veterinary medicine to allow emergency medical services personnel to provide emergency transport or medical services to an injured K-9 police unit animal or certified search and rescue dog deployed by or contracted to work with a federal, State, or local agency or department at the scene of an emergency. Emergency medical dispatchers would not be considered medical services personnel for purposes of this section.

**Section 1.(b)** would provide limited immunity to emergency medical services personnel who provide emergency transport or medical services to an injured K-9 police unit animal or an injured search and rescue dog. Emergency medical dispatchers would not be considered medical services personnel for purposes of this section.

**EFFECTIVE DATE:** The PCS would be effective October 1, 2021 and apply to acts on or after that date.
