

HOUSE BILL 743: Remove ID Mark/Increase Punishment.

OVERVIEW: House Bill 743 would make the alteration or destruction of an identifying number from personal property or certain machinery a Class H felony if the value of the item was greater than \$1,000.

CURRENT LAW AND BILL ANALYSIS:

House Bill 743 would make changes to the punishment for destroying identifying numbers on property or machinery similar to the punishment for the crime of larceny which provides a Class 1 misdemeanor for the theft of goods with a value of \$1,000 or less, and a Class H felony for the theft of goods with a value greater than \$1,000.

<u>G.S. 14-160.1</u> currently makes the alteration, destruction, or removal of a serial number from any item of personal property, a Class 1 misdemeanor.

Section 1 of the bill would amend G.S. 14-160.1 to create a Class H felony for altering, destroying, or removing the serial number of personal property with a value greater than \$1,000.

<u>G.S. 14-401.4</u> currently makes the willful removal, destruction, or alteration of an identifying number on a machine or other apparatus, a Class 1 misdemeanor.

Section 2 of the bill would amend G.S. 14-401.4 to create a Class H felony for the willful removal, destruction, or alteration of an identifying number on a machine or other apparatus *with a value greater than* \$1,000.

EFFECTIVE DATE: This act becomes effective December 1, 2021, and applies to offenses committed on or after that date.

BACKGROUND:

A Class 1 misdemeanor is punishable from a minimum of 1 day community punishment to a maximum 120 day active sentence.

A Class H felony is punishable from a minimum of 4 months community punishment to a maximum of 39 month active sentence.
