

HOUSE BILL 1060: Add At-Large Members/Macon Co. Board of Comm.

OVERVIEW: House Bill 1060 would modify the method of election for the Macon County Board of Commissioners to provide for two members to be elected at-large and three members to be elected from districts.

[As introduced, this bill was identical to S903, as introduced by Sen. Corbin, which is currently in Senate Redistricting and Elections.]

CURRENT LAW: The Macon County Board of Commissioners consists of five members, elected to serve staggered four-year terms. For all five members, the qualified voters of the entire county vote for each; however, one member must be a resident of District One, three members must be a resident of District Two, and one member must be a resident of District Three.

BILL ANALYSIS: Effective with the 2026 elections, the bill would change the method of electing members of the Macon County Board of Commissioners to require that one member be elected from each of the three districts and two members be elected from the county at-large. Members would continue to serve staggered four-year terms of office.

In 2026 and quadrennially thereafter, one member would be elected from District 1, one member would be elected from District 2, and one member would be elected at-large. In 2028 and quadrennially thereafter, one member would be elected from District 3 and one member would be elected at-large.

EFFECTIVE DATE: Effective when it becomes law.
