

SENATE BILL 274: Home Assistance Services.

OVERVIEW: Senate Bill 274 would exempt home assistance services from home care licensure requirements, explain what home assistance services are, and set requirements for home assistance service providers.

BILL ANALYSIS:

Section 1.(a) creates a definition for "home assistance services" in the Home Care Agency Licensure Act. Home assistance services do not require licensure and are not home care services. Home assistance services include:

- In-home companion, sitter, and respite care services provided to an individual.
- Homemaker services provided in combination with in-home companion, sitter, respite, or other home care services.
- Non-hands-on care services, as defined in 10A NCAC 13J .1501(2) which specifies basic home management tasks, shopping, meal preparation, transportation, companion services, socialization, medication reminders, and other services that do not require the service provider to use "hands-on care" and which do not require training or verification of skills by a Registered Nurse.

Section 1.(b) specifies that home assistance services include home-based, community-based and transportation-based services such as:

- Meal preparation, cleaning and organizing, caring for pets, and other home management services.
- Grocery shopping, retail shopping, and pick-up and drop-off of various items.
- Travel to and from medical appointments, social events, and activities.

Section 1.(c) requires a home assistance services provider to maintain liability insurance and to inform all new clients it is not licensed by the State and it does not provide health care or hands-on services. Home assistance services providers must follow certain requirements for conducting criminal background checks on contractors and employees.

Section 1.(d) prohibits a home assistance services provider from submitting claims for reimbursement for services rendered.

EFFECTIVE DATE: The bill would become effective when it becomes law.

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
