

SENATE BILL 465: Cities/Remove and Dispose of Abandoned Vessels.

OVERVIEW: S.L. 2023-27 expands authority over the removal and disposal of abandoned vessels from coastal counties to all counties and grants that same authority to cities.

This act became effective June 2, 2023, and does not invalidate any local acts authorizing ordinances regulating the removal and disposal of vessels from navigable waters or any ordinances that were adopted under that authority before this act became law.

CURRENT LAW & BILL ANALYSIS:

G.S. 153A-132(i) grants to the 20 coastal counties covered under the Coastal Area Management Act of 1974 (CAMA) authority to adopt ordinances to prohibit the abandonment of vessels within the navigable waters of the county's ordinance-making jurisdiction and provides for the removal and disposal of abandoned vessels.

This authority over abandoned vessels does not extend to shipwrecks, vessels, cargoes, tackle, or other underwater archeological remains that have been in place for more than 10 years, which cannot be removed without the approval of the Department of Natural and Cultural Resources, the legal owner of such historical properties.

Section 1 expands that authority to all counties in the State, not just those coastal counties covered under CAMA.

Section 2 grants that same authority to cities.

EFFECTIVE DATE: This act became effective June 2, 2023, and does not invalidate any local acts authorizing ordinances regulating the removal and disposal of vessels from navigable waters or any ordinances that were adopted under that authority before this act became law.
